Critical theory is generally associated with the ideas of the University of Frankfurt's Institute for Social Research, often referred to as the "Frankfurt School," while cultural studies had its genesis in the UK, principally at the Birmingham Center for Critical and Cultural Studies. But critical theory and cultural studies are deeply mutually implicated, and their interrelationships are significant.

In France, a series of sociologists and philosophers developed social theory. In Birmingham, England, this developed into Stuart Hall's version of cultural studies. Critical Studies had come to the United States with the exiles from Germany. But in the oppressive environment of the Cold War, anything hinting at Marxism was dangerous.

This book argues that we have moved into a new cultural period, automodernity, which represents a social, psychological, and technological reaction to postmodernity. In fact, by showing how individual autonomy is now being generated through technological and cultural automation, Samuels posits that we must rethink modernity and postmodernity.

Gunster juxtaposes Benjamin's thoughts on memory, experience, and capitalism with Adorno's critique of mass culture and modern aesthetics to illuminate the key position that the commodity form plays in each thinker's work and to invigorate the dialectical complexity their writings acquire when considered together. This blending of perspectives is subsequently used to ground a theoretical interrogation of the comparative failure of cultural studies to engage substantively with the effect of commodification upon cultural practices. As a result, *Capitalizing on Culture* offers a fresh examination of critical theory that will be valuable to scholars studying the intersection of culture and capitalism.
